

## NORTH KOREA GENOCIDE EXHIBIT

It's been described as the "Hermit Kingdom", the "most closed society on earth today" and "the world's biggest concentration camp".

For four days only, area residents will have the opportunity to see what life is like for North Koreans as the North Korea Genocide Exhibit stops in Washington, D.C. for its World Tour April 23-26, 2007.

As Kim Jong-il works aggressively to keep the world's attention focused on his nuclear weapons, come see what he is trying to hide from the world: what life is really like in Kim Jong-il's "Paradise."

Hosted by the International Coalition to Save the North Korean Slaves under the direction of rescuer Moon Kook-Han, the Exhibit which first opened in Seoul in 2004 depicts the plight and suffering of the North Korean people: the famine, the political prison camps, and the refugees' desperate escapes through China and other nations. It also exposes the regime's involvement in the abduction of citizens from Korea, Japan and other nations, their holding of POWs from the Korean War, and other atrocities. Video footage smuggled out of North Korea of public executions, the award winning documentary **Seoul Train**, images provided by the U.S. Committee for Human Rights in North Korea, Jean-Baptiste Oh's famous painting Death and Despair are all featured in the Exhibit. VIP Ribbon Cutting Ceremony at noon April 24.

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
